Human sP-selectin Platinum ELISA

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1. Intended Use

The human sP-selectin ELISA is an enzyme-linked immunosorbent assay for the quantitative detection of human sP-selectin. The human sP-selectin ELISA is for research use only. Not for diagnostic or therapeutic procedures.

2. Summary

P-selectin (CD62, GMP-140, PADGEM) belongs to the selectin family of adhesion molecules. P-selectin acts as a receptor that supports binding of leukocytes to activated platelets and endothelium. P-selectin-mediated adhesive interactions operate in conjunction with cell-cell interactions directed by related molecules and are likely to be important in both hemostatic and inflammatory processes.

P-selectin is located in membranes of a granules in unstimulated platelets and redistributed to the cell surface upon platelet activation. P-selectin is also present in endothelial cells in membranes of Weibel-Palade bodies and megakaryocytes. Surface appearance of P-selectin is very rapid, but transient declining to basal level within short time following stimulation.

P-selectin is a 140 kDa protein that is highly glycosylated. The cDNA-derived amino acid sequence predicts a molecule with a series of cysteine-rich domains. Like the other selectins P-selectin contains an N-terminal Ca2+ dependent lectin-like domain and an EGF-like motif which is followed by nine consensus repeats, a transmembrane domain, and a short cytoplasmic tail.

The human gene for P-selectin is located on chromosome 1q21-24. P-selectin is a receptor for neutrophils and monocytes, recognizing oligosaccharide structures on the target cells.

The physiologic role of P-selectin might be the mediation of initial leukocyte adhesion to activated endothelium during acute inflammation. It may work in concert with E-selectin to direct early, regionally specific adherence of neutrophils and monocytes at sites of acute inflammation. A soluble form of P-selectin found in serum and plasma has been described which might represent a proteolytic fragment or more likely a soluble splice variant lacking the transmembrane domain. Soluble P-selectin is a potentially important molecule to provide more detailed insight into pathological situations. Excessive accumulation of neutrophils on the endothelial surface accompanied by high exposure of

P-selectin has been implicated in a number of inflammatory disorders, including adult respiratory distress syndrome, acute lung injury, ischemia-reperfusion injury, Gram-negative septic shock, thrombotic diseases and rheumatoid arthritis.


Malignant cells were shown to express receptors for P-selectin suggesting an important role for P-selectin in tumor formation and metastasis. Platelets have also been shown to promote tumor metastasis.

3. Principles of the Test

An anti-human sP-selectin coating antibody is adsorbed onto microwells.

Human sP-selectin present in the sample or standard binds to antibodies adsorbed to the microwells and the HRP-conjugated antihuman sP-selectin antibody is added and binds to human sP-selectin captured by the first antibody.

Following incubation unbound HRP-conjugated anti-human sP-selectin is removed during a wash step, and substrate solution reactive with HRP is added to the wells.

A coloured product is formed in proportion to the amount of human sP-selectin present in the sample or standard. The reaction is terminated by addition of acid and absorbance is measured at 450 nm. A standard curve is prepared from 7 human sP-selectin standard dilutions and human sP-selectin concentration determined.

Figure 2 First Incubation




Figure 3 Second Incubation




4. Reagents Provided

5. Storage Instructions – ELISA Kit

Store kit reagents between 2° and 8°C except controls. Store lyophilized controls at -20°C.

Immediately after use remaining reagents should be returned to cold storage (2° to 8°C), or to -20°C, respectively. Expiry of the kit and reagents is stated on labels.

Expiry of the kit components can only be guaranteed if the components are stored properly, and if, in case of repeated use of one component, this reagent is not contaminated by the first handling.

6. Specimen Collection and Storage Instructions

Cell culture supernatant, serum, plasma (EDTA, citrate, heparin) and amniotic fluid were tested with this assay. Other biological samples might be suitable for use in the assay. Remove serum or plasma from the clot or cells as soon as possible after clotting and separation.

Samples containing a visible precipitate must be clarified prior to use in the assay. Do not use grossly hemolyzed or lipemic specimens.

Samples should be aliquoted and must be stored frozen at -20°C to avoid loss of bioactive human sP-selectin. If samples are to be run within 24 hours, they may be stored at 2° to 8°C (for sample stability refer to 13.5).

Avoid repeated freeze-thaw cycles. Prior to assay, the frozen sample should be brought to room temperature slowly and mixed gently.

7. Materials Required But Not Provided

- 5 ml and 10 ml graduated pipettes
- 5 μl to 1000 μl adjustable single channel micropipettes with disposable tips
- 50 µl to 300 µl adjustable multichannel micropipette with disposable tips
- Multichannel micropipette reservoir
- Beakers, flasks, cylinders necessary for preparation of reagents
- Device for delivery of wash solution (multichannel wash bottle or automatic wash system)
- Microwell strip reader capable of reading at 450 nm (620 nm as optional reference wave length)
- Glass-distilled or deionized water
- Statistical calculator with program to perform regression analysis

8. Precautions for Use

- All reagents should be considered as potentially hazardous. We therefore recommend that this product is handled only by those persons who have been trained in laboratory techniques and that it is used in accordance with the principles of good laboratory practice. Wear suitable protective clothing such as laboratory overalls, safety glasses and gloves. Care should be taken to avoid contact with skin or eyes. In the case of contact with skin or eyes wash immediately with water. See material safety data sheet(s) and/or safety statement(s) for specific advice.
- Reagents are intended for research use only and are not for use in diagnostic or therapeutic procedures.
- Do not mix or substitute reagents with those from other lots or other sources.
- Do not use kit reagents beyond expiration date on label.
- Do not expose kit reagents to strong light during storage or incubation.
- Do not pipette by mouth.
- Do not eat or smoke in areas where kit reagents or samples are handled.
- Avoid contact of skin or mucous membranes with kit reagents or specimens.
- Rubber or disposable latex gloves should be worn while handling kit reagents or specimens.
- Avoid contact of substrate solution with oxidizing agents and metal.
- Avoid splashing or generation of aerosols.
- In order to avoid microbial contamination or cross-contamination of reagents or specimens which may invalidate the test use disposable pipette tips and/or pipettes.
- Use clean, dedicated reagent trays for dispensing the conjugate and substrate reagent.

- Exposure to acid inactivates the conjugate.
- Glass-distilled water or deionized water must be used for reagent preparation.
- Substrate solution must be at room temperature prior to use.
- Decontaminate and dispose specimens and all potentially contaminated materials as they could contain infectious agents. The preferred method of decontamination is autoclaving for a minimum of 1 hour at 121.5°C.
- Liquid wastes not containing acid and neutralized waste may be mixed with sodium hypochlorite in volumes such that the final mixture contains 1.0% sodium hypochlorite. Allow 30 minutes for effective decontamination. Liquid waste containing acid must be neutralized prior to the addition of sodium hypochlorite.

9. Preparation of Reagents

Buffer Concentrates should be brought to room temperature and should be diluted before starting the test procedure. If crystals have formed in the **Buffer Concentrates**, warm them gently until they have completely dissolved.

9.1. Wash Buffer (1x)

Pour entire contents (50 ml) of the **Wash Buffer Concentrate** (20x) into a clean 1000 ml graduated cylinder. Bring to final volume of 1000 ml with glass-distilled or deionized water.

Mix gently to avoid foaming.

Transfer to a clean wash bottle and store at 2° to 25°C. Please note that Wash Buffer (1x) is stable for 30 days.

Wash Buffer (1x) may also be prepared as needed according to the following table:

9.2. Assay Buffer (1x)

Pour the entire contents (5 ml) of the **Assay Buffer Concentrate** (20x) into a clean 100 ml graduated cylinder. Bring to final volume of 100 ml with distilled water. Mix gently to avoid foaming.

Store at 2° to 8°C. Please note that the Assay Buffer (1x) is stable for 30 days.

Assay Buffer (1x) may also be prepared as needed according to the following table:

9.3. HRP-Conjugate

Please note that the HRP-Conjugate should be used within 30 minutes after dilution.

Make a 1:100 dilution of the concentrated **HRP-Conjugate** solution with Assay Buffer (1x) in a clean plastic tube as needed according to the following table:

9.4. Human sP-selectin Standard

Reconstitute **human sP-selectin standard** by addition of distilled water. Reconstitution volume is stated on the label of the standard vial. Swirl or mix gently to insure complete and homogeneous solubilization (concentration of reconstituted standard = 80 ng/ml). Allow the standard to reconstitute for 10-30 minutes. Mix well prior to

Allow the standard to reconstitute for 10-30 minutes. Mix well prior to making dilutions.

After usage remaining standard cannot be stored and has to be discarded.

Standard dilutions can be prepared directly on the microwell plate (see 10.c) or alternatively in tubes (see 9.4.1).

9.4.1. External Standard Dilution

Label 7 tubes, one for each standard point.

S1, S2, S3, S4, S5, S6, S7


Then prepare 1:2 serial dilutions for the standard curve as follows: Pipette 225 µl of Sample Diluent into each tube.

Pipette 225 μ I of reconstituted standard (concentration of standard = 80 ng/ml) into the first tube, labelled S1, and mix (concentration of standard 1 = 40 ng/ml).

Pipette 225 µl of this dilution into the second tube, labelled S2, and mix thoroughly before the next transfer.

Repeat serial dilutions 5 more times thus creating the points of the standard curve (see Figure 5).

Sample Diluent serves as blank.



9.5. Controls

Reconstitute by adding 100 µl distilled water to lyophilized **controls** (10-30 minutes). Further treat the controls like your samples in the assay. For control range please refer to certificate of analysis or vial label. Store reconstituted controls aliquoted at -20°C. Avoid repeated freeze and thaw cycles.

9.6. Addition of Colour-giving Reagents: Blue-Dye, Green-Dye

In order to help our customers to avoid any mistakes in pipetting the Platinum ELISAs, eBioscience offers a tool that helps to monitor the addition of even very small volumes of a solution to the reaction well by giving distinctive colours to each step of the ELISA procedure.

This procedure is optional, does not in any way interfere with the test results, and is designed to help the customer with the performance of the test, but can also be omitted, just following the instruction booklet.

Alternatively, the dye solutions from the stocks provided (*Blue-Dye*, *Green-Dye*) can be added to the reagents according to the following guidelines:

1. Diluent:

Before standard and sample dilution add the **Blue-Dye** at a dilution of 1:250 (see table below) to the appropriate diluent (1x) according to the test protocol. After addition of **Blue-Dye**, proceed according to the instruction booklet.

2. HRP-Conjugate:


Before dilution of the concentrated HRP-Conjugate add the *Green-Dye* at a dilution of 1:100 (see table below) to the Assay Buffer (1x) used for the final conjugate dilution. Proceed after addition of *Green-Dye* according to the instruction booklet: Preparation of HRP-Conjugate.

10. Test Protocol

- a. Determine the number of microwell strips required to test the desired number of samples plus appropriate number of wells needed for running blanks and standards. Each sample, standard, blank and optional control samples should be assayed in duplicate. Remove extra microwell strips from holder and store in foil bag with the desiccant provided at 2°-8°C sealed tightly.
- b. Wash the microwell strips twice with approximately 400 µl Wash Buffer per well with thorough aspiration of microwell contents between washes. Allow the Wash Buffer to sit in the wells for about 10 15 seconds before aspiration. Take care not to scratch the surface of the microwells.
 After the last wash step, empty wells and tap microwell strips on absorbent pad or paper towel to remove excess Wash Buffer. Use the microwell strips immediately after washing. Alternatively microwell strips can be placed upside down on a wet absorbent paper for not longer than 15 minutes. Do not allow wells to dry.
- c. Standard dilution on the microwell plate (Alternatively the standard dilution can be prepared in tubes see 9.4.1.):
 Add 100 μl of Sample Diluent in duplicate to all standard wells. Pipette 100 μl of prepared standard (see Preparation of Standard 9.4, concentration = 80.00 ng/ml) in duplicate into well A1 and A2 (see Table 1). Mix the contents of wells A1 and A2 by repeated aspiration and ejection (concentration of standard 1, S1 = 40.00 ng/ml), and transfer 100 μl to wells B1 and B2, respectively (see Figure 6). Take care not to scratch the inner surface of the microwells. Continue this procedure 5 times, creating two rows of human sP-selectin standard dilutions ranging from 40.00 to 0.63 ng/ml. Discard 100 μl of the contents from the last microwells (G1, G2) used.

In case of an <u>external standard dilution</u> (see 9.4.1), pipette 100 μ l of these standard dilutions (S1 - S7) in the standard wells according to Table 1.

- d. Add 100 µl of **Sample Diluent** in duplicate to the **blank wells**.
- e. Add 90 µl of **Sample Diluent** to the **sample wells**.
- f. Add 10 µl of each **sample** in duplicate to the **sample wells**.
- g. Prepare **HRP-Conjugate** (see Preparation of HRP-Conjugate 9.3).
- h. Add 50 µl of **HRP-Conjugate** to all wells.
- i. Cover with an adhesive film and incubate at room temperature (18 to 25°C) for 2 hours, if available on a microplate shaker set at 400 rpm.
- j. Remove adhesive film and empty wells. Wash microwell strips 3 times according to point b. of the test protocol. Proceed immediately to the next step.
- k. Pipette 100 µl of **TMB Substrate Solution** to all wells.
- Incubate the microwell strips at room temperature (18° to 25°C) for about 30 min. Avoid direct exposure to intense light.

The colour development on the plate should be monitored and the substrate reaction stopped (see next point of this protocol) before positive wells are no longer properly recordable. Determination of the ideal time period for colour development has to be done individually for each assay.

It is recommended to add the stop solution when the highest standard has developed a dark blue colour. Alternatively the colour development can be monitored by the ELISA reader at 620 nm. The substrate reaction should be stopped as soon as Standard 1 has reached an OD of 0.9-0.95.

m. Stop the enzyme reaction by quickly pipetting 100 μl of **Stop Solution** into each well. It is important that the Stop Solution is spread quickly and uniformly throughout the microwells to completely inactivate the enzyme. Results must be read immediately after the Stop Solution is added or within one hour if the microwell strips are stored at 2 - 8°C in the dark.

n. Read absorbance of each microwell on a spectro-photometer using 450 nm as the primary wave length (optionally 620 nm as the reference wave length; 610 nm to 650 nm is acceptable). Blank the plate reader according to the manufacturer's instructions by using the blank wells. Determine the absorbance of both the samples and the standards.

Note: In case of incubation without shaking the obtained O.D. values may be lower than indicated below. Nevertheless the results are still valid.

11. Calculation of Results

- Calculate the average absorbance values for each set of duplicate standards and samples. Duplicates should be within 20 per cent of the mean value.
- Create a standard curve by plotting the mean absorbance for each standard concentration on the ordinate against the human sPselectin concentration on the abscissa. Draw a best fit curve through the points of the graph (a 5-parameter curve fit is recommended).
- To determine the concentration of circulating human sP-selectin for each sample, first find the mean absorbance value on the ordinate and extend a horizontal line to the standard curve. At the point of intersection, extend a vertical line to the abscissa and read the corresponding human sP-selectin concentration.
- If instructions in this protocol have been followed samples have been diluted 1:10 (10 μl sample + 90 μl Sample Diluent), the concentration read from the standard curve must be multiplied by the dilution factor (x 10).
- Calculation of samples with a concentration exceeding standard 1 may result in incorrect, low human sP-selectin levels. Such samples require further external predilution according to expected human sP-selectin values with Sample Diluent in order to precisely quantitate the actual human sP-selectin level.
- It is suggested that each testing facility establishes a control sample of known human sP-selectin concentration and runs this additional control with each assay. If the values obtained are not within the expected range of the control, the assay results may be invalid.
- A representative standard curve is shown in Figure 7. This curve cannot be used to derive test results. Each laboratory must prepare a standard curve for each group of microwell strips assayed.

Representative standard curve for human sP-selectin ELISA. Human sP-selectin was diluted in serial 2-fold steps in Sample Diluent . Do not use this standard curve to derive test results. A standard curve must be run for each group of microwell strips assayed.



The OD values of the standard curve may vary according to the conditions of assay performance (e.g. operator, pipetting technique, washing technique or temperature effects). Furthermore shelf life of the kit may affect enzymatic activity and thus colour intensity. Values measured are still valid.

12. Limitations

- Since exact conditions may vary from assay to assay, a standard curve must be established for every run.
- Bacterial or fungal contamination of either screen samples or reagents or cross-contamination between reagents may cause erroneous results.
- Disposable pipette tips, flasks or glassware are preferred, reusable glassware must be washed and thoroughly rinsed of all detergents before use.
- Improper or insufficient washing at any stage of the procedure will result in either false positive or false negative results. Empty wells completely before dispensing fresh wash solution, fill with Wash Buffer as indicated for each wash cycle and do not allow wells to sit uncovered or dry for extended periods.
- The use of radioimmunotherapy has significantly increased the number of patients with human anti-mouse IgG antibodies (HAMA). HAMA may interfere with assays utilizing murine monoclonal antibodies leading to both false positive and false negative results. Serum samples containing antibodies to murine immunoglobulins can still be analysed in such assays when murine immunoglobulins (serum, ascitic fluid, or monoclonal antibodies of irrelevant specificity) are added to the sample.

13. Performance Characteristics

13.1. Sensitivity

The limit of detection of human sP-selectin defined as the analyte concentration resulting in an absorbance significantly higher than that of the dilution medium (mean plus 2 standard deviations) was determined to be 0.20 ng/ml (mean of 6 independent assays).

13.2. Reproducibility

13.2.1. Intra-assay

Reproducibility within the assay was evaluated in 3 independent experiments. Each assay was carried out with 6 replicates of 8 serum samples containing different concentrations of human sP-selectin. 2 standard curves were run on each plate. Data below show the mean human sP-selectin concentration and the coefficient of variation for each sample (see Table 3). The calculated overall intra-assay coefficient of variation was 7.8%.

13.2.2. Inter-assay

Assay to assay reproducibility within one laboratory was evaluated in 3 independent experiments. Each assay was carried out with 6 replicates of 8 serum samples containing different concentrations of human sP-selectin. 2 standard curves were run on each plate. Data below show the mean human sP-selectin concentration and the coefficient of variation calculated on 18 determinations of each sample (see Table 4). The calculated overall inter-assay coefficient of variation was 5.4%.

13.3. Spike Recovery

The spike recovery was evaluated by spiking 3 levels of human sP-selectin into samples. Recoveries were determined in 3 independent experiments with 6 replicates each.

The amount of endogenous human sP-selectin in unspiked samples was subtracted from the spike values.

For recovery data see Table 5.

13.4. Dilution Parallelism

4 serum samples with different levels of human sP-selectin were analysed at serial 2 fold dilutions with 4 replicates each. The recovery ranged from 81.3% to 108.9% with an overall recovery of 91.6% (see Table 6).

13.5. Sample Stability

13.5.1. Freeze-Thaw Stability

Aliquots of serum samples (spiked or unspiked) were stored at -20°C and thawed 5 times, and the human sP-selectin levels determined. There was no significant loss of human sP-selectin immunoreactivity detected by freezing and thawing.

13.5.2. Storage Stability

Aliquots of serum samples (spiked or unspiked) were stored at -20°C, 2-8°C, room temperature (RT) and at 37°C, and the human sP-selectin level determined after 24 h. There was no significant loss of human sP-selectin immunoreactivity detected during storage under above conditions.

13.6. Comparison of Serum and Plasma

From 2 individuals each, serum as well as EDTA, citrate, and heparin plasma was obtained at the same time and tested for human sP-selectin. Concentrations were not significantly different and therefore all these blood preparations are suitable for use in the assay. It is nevertheless highly recommended to assure the uniformity of blood preparations.

13.7. Specificity

The assay detects both natural and recombinant human sP-selectin. The cross reactivity and interference of circulating factors of the immune system was evaluated by spiking these proteins at physiologically relevant concentrations into a human sP-selectin positive sample. There was no cross reactivity or interference detected, notably not with human sE-selectin and human sL-selectin.

13.8. Expected Values

Panels of 40 serum as well as EDTA, citrate and heparin plasma samples from randomly selected apparently healthy donors (males and females) were tested for human sP-selectin (see Table 7). The levels measured may vary with the sample collection used. For detected human sP-selectin levels see Table 7.

15.1. Wash Buffer (1x)

Add Wash Buffer Concentrate 20x (50 ml) to 950 ml distilled water.

15.4. Human sP-selectin Standard

Reconstitute lyophilized **human sP-selectin standard** with distilled water. (Reconstitution volume is stated on the label of the standard vial.)

15.5. Controls

Add 100 µl distilled water to lyophilized **controls**.

16. Test Protocol Summary

- 1. Determine the number of microwell strips required.
- Wash microwell strips twice with Wash Buffer.
- 3. Standard dilution on the microwell plate: Add 100 µl Sample Diluent, in duplicate, to all standard wells. Pipette 100 µl prepared standard into the first wells and create standard dilutions by transferring 100 µl from well to well. Discard 100 µl from the last wells.

Alternatively <u>external standard dilution</u> in tubes (see 9.4.1): Pipette 100 µl of these standard dilutions in the microwell strips.

- 4. Add 100 μl Sample Diluent , in duplicate, to the blank wells.
- 5. Add 90 µl Sample Diluent to sample wells.
- 6. Add 10 μl sample in duplicate, to designated sample wells.
- 7. Prepare HRP-Conjugate.
- 8. Add 50 µl HRP-Conjugate to all wells.
- 9. Cover microwell strips and incubate 2 hours at room temperature (18° to 25°C).
- 10. Empty and wash microwell strips 3 times with Wash Buffer.
- 11. Add 100 µl of TMB Substrate Solution to all wells.
- 12. Incubate the microwell strips for about 30 minutes at room temperature (18° to 25°C).
- 13. Add 100 µl Stop Solution to all wells.
- 14. Blank microwell reader and measure colour intensity at 450 nm.

Note: If instructions in this protocol have been followed samples have been diluted 1:10 (10 μ l sample + 90 μ l Sample Diluent), the concentration read from the standard curve must be multiplied by the dilution factor (x 10).
